

Phase II: system enhancement & experiments

- Improving existing system (eg OOHC standards)
- Increasing early prevention & intervention focus (Third Action Plan 2015-18)

#### THIRD ACTION PLAN 2015-18

- Three new National Strategies:
  - 1. Early intervention with focus on the early years, especially first thousand days for a child
  - 2. Helping young people in OOHC to thrive in adulthood
  - 3. Organisations responding better to children to keep them safe
- Cross-cutting focus areas: Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children, & research




#### SOME SPECIFICS

- 17 areas, including full application ATSICPP, community awareness raising, identifying locations of high incidence family violence and better service coordination, trial ways to improve support for young people leaving care, implement OOHC standards
- Expect to hear more Coalition meeting 17 August and by jurisdiction


### PROBLEM UPDATED; PROBLEM UNABATED

### TOWARDS PHASE 3: IDEAS FOR CULTURAL & SYSTEMS TRANSFORMATION

- 1. Build a multi-decade **national plan of action** for children and young people encompassing not only child safety but other domains such as health and education to focus attention and actions
  - Make a great 'First Thousand Days for a Child' a community/political norm
  - Develop a multi-generational, multi-sectoral investment strategy to fuel the plan and specifically in relation to child safety
- 2. Re-run the 2005 Senate Inquiry entitled 'Protecting vulnerable children; a national challenge'
- 3. Support SNAICC's **Family Matters** campaign, particularly its request for COAG to adopt a target to help drive national efforts
